

Horizons Foundation 2008 Grantmaking



Horizons Foundation is best known for our grantmaking, which focuses on lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) organizations and causes in the San Francisco Bay Area. Since 1980, our grants have provided direct financial support to LGBT nonprofits across issues, populations, and geography.

In 2008, we made **515 grants totaling \$2,271,117** to help strengthen the LGBT community. This is only the second time in Horizons' 29-year history that we've crossed the \$2 million mark in a single year—and we are deeply grateful to the individual donors, community organizations, and collaborating foundations and corporations who made this possible.

In Horizons' wide-ranging portfolio of grant, many grantees were selected using community-led grantmaking processes, while others came from donor-advised and special funds. Together, the grants—funded thanks to our generous donors, institutional partners, and the LGBT Community Endowment Fund—represent support for the full spectrum of advocacy, services, and programs that move the entire LGBT community forward.

2008 Community Issues Grants



The cornerstone of Horizons' grantmaking portfolio, Community Issues grants are awarded to LGBT organizations and projects throughout the nine Bay Area counties and address a wide range of populations and issues. To ensure that these grants respond to evolving community needs, Horizons actively engages a diverse panel of volunteers to review proposals and recommend grants. In 2008, Horizons awarded 28 Community Issues grants totaling \$168,000.

Community Issues grants are made possible in large part by the generosity of hundreds of Horizons donors, including those whose bequests and planned gifts have supported Horizons Foundation's LGBT Community Endowment Fund. The grants are also funded in part by support from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation.

2008 HIV/AIDS Community Grants



The HIV/AIDS Community Grants are made to organizations working to ensure access to AIDS treatments, stop the spread of HIV, and offer critically needed housing assistance and other services to people living with HIV/AIDS. In 2008, this program supported 58 organizations with \$561,500 in grants.

Since 1999, Horizons Foundation has collaborated on the HIV/AIDS Community Grants with the San Francisco AIDS Foundation, whose fundraising efforts through the AIDS Walk, San Francisco Marathon, and general unrestricted contributions have funded the grants.

2008 LGBT WISE Grants

The LGBT WISE: Working to Improve Services to Elders grants continued in 2008 through Horizons' partnership with The California Wellness Foundation. This landmark program increases the capacity of LGBT organizations in the Bay Area to provide services to LGBT elders, a population that is critically underserved—and growing. Programs eligible for funding include food and nutrition services, access to health care, and in-home support for elders. In addition to receiving funding, the LGBT WISE grantees also meet regularly to foster peer learning and create practical connections among different regions in the Bay Area. The 2008 LGBT WISE grants totaled \$185,726.

Horizons saw the power and promise of the LGBT Community Endowment Fund in action in 2008. Thanks to the generosity of our Legacy Circle members, whose gifts are building the Endowment Fund, we were able to invest in early efforts to keep Proposition 8 off the ballot. Although the outcome was not what we'd hoped, Horizons' ability to make a significant, timely grant on an urgent issue demonstrated the potential of the Endowment Fund to alter the funding landscape for the LGBT community.

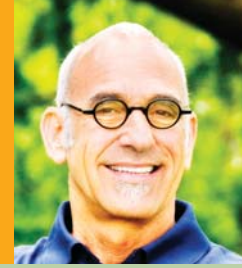
